SCHOOL OVERVIEW

The mission of Achievement First Amistad High School, a collegepreparatory public charter school in New Haven, Connecticut, is to provide students from historically-underserved communities with a top-quality education to prepare them for the rigor of college work and help them flourish on college campuses. AF Amistad High's approach includes a rigorous, college-preparatory course of study, tutoring, intensive college counseling, and robust athletic and elective programs.

- AF Amistad High serves predominantly Black and Latinx students from Bridgeport and New Haven. Our communities face a pronounced racial achievement gap, a factor that contributes to Connecticut's troubling status as the state with the largest achievement gap in the nation. Approximately 85% of AF Amistad High students will be the first in their families to attend a four-year college or university.
- Because of their longer academic day and year, students at AF Amistad High receive nearly 400 hours of additional classroom time compared to their peers in traditional New Haven district schools.
- AF Amistad High's rigorous curriculum emphasizes core academic subjects: literature, composition, history, math, and science. Students are required to take four full years of coursework in each of these subjects.
- Over 90% of students take at least one Advanced Placement course, and approximately half of the school's students take two or more AP courses.

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
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GRADING POLICY & PHILOSOPHY

- AF Amistad High uses a 100-point grading scale, with 70 as the minimum grade to pass a course and 50 as the lowest published grade. Weighted Grade Point Average (GPA) is calculated as the arithmetic average (total quality points divided by credits) of all weighted courses taken.
- The faculty strives to protect against grade inflation; consequently, "A"s and "B"s are hard-earned. While AF Amistad High students may have overall lower GPAs than their peers in traditional district schools, this is not a reflection of their academic tenacity or ultimate mastery. Rather, it is a reflection of the high expectations to which students are held.

- Matching all students with a college success counselor who provides individualized outreach and support.
- Building cohorts of AF graduates at schools with high expected college completion rates for students of color.
