Analysis: Lit - Oscar Wao

ABSTRACT/SUMMARY:

This paper scores a low one because each paragraph has a general controlling idea presented in the topic sentence. However, they do not pose an argument, and they do not answer the prompt (although they are vaguely relevant). Moreover, the thesis statement does not pose an argument.

CRITERION 1: THESIS

The thesis statement is not defensible nor does it address the prompt; it is a stock vague definition of a "coming of age" and does not reflect any of the content of the novel. No one could argue that someone who "came of age" did so *not* because of "experiences" and "challenges." In addition, one could argue that Oscar Wao, the character, did *not* overcome his challenges in the novel, as evidenced by his death.

CRITERION 2: ASSERTIONS

The topic sentences read as follows:

- "When Oscar was younger, he had all the girls."
- "Nevertheless, Oscar was now a teenager."
- "Oscar was now an adult; he knew what he wanted and how he was going to get it."

The first topic sentence is vaguely connected to the prompt, but factually inaccurate to the novel. (Throughout the paper, the writer confuses the narrator of the novel, Yunior, with Oscar.) Moreover, it does not present any argument that supports the vague thesis statement, although the concept of him "getting all the girls" is *vaguely* connected to the idea of "coming of age." The weakest topic sentence is the second, which does not contain any content (accurate or not) that can relate back to the thesis statement. The third assertion is not accurate for either Oscar *or* Yunior, but is another stock statement about being an adult that does not address the prompt (although vaguely connected to "coming of age").

In general, however, each topic sentence presents an attempt at a controlling idea for the paragraph. They are also all *relevant* to the prompt because they attempt to address the progression of a coming-of-age of the main character. However, they do not support the thesis because of the factual inaccuracy to the book, and the lack of any argumentative statement in the topic sentences themselves.
