Term: "Comprehensive"

Definition:

A comprehensive thesis addresses the entire task and takes the entire text or content into consideration. If a thesis is comprehensive, it encompasses the full extent of claims and evidence can stand. If there is a glaring contradictory point that is not acknowledged or blatant contradictory evidence that is not taken into consideration, the thesis is not comprehensive. These non-comprehensive theses frequently cherry pick subarguments and evidence without taking the entire text or context into consideration.
